1. Yamagata University

Yamagata University has six faculties with twelve study courses, one interdisciplinary school and six post-graduate courses. Its four campuses are Kojirakawa (Humanities and Social Sciences; Education, Art and Science*; and Science) and Iida (Medicine), both in Yamagata City, Yonezawa (Engineering), and Tsuruoka (Agriculture).

 $*Faculty of \ Education, Art \ and \ Science \ is \ scheduled \ to \ be \ reorganized \ into \ Faculty \ of \ Education \ in \ April \ 2026.$

The total number of students is about 9,000. One of the leading universities in the Tōhoku area of Northern Japan, it fulfills an important role in both study and research. Yamagata University aims to foster well-balanced individuals equipped with knowledge, virtue, and physical well-being, who are suited to the demands of a new era. Guided by its three core missions—regional revitalization, nurturing the next generation, and promoting multicultural coexistence—as well as its fundamental educational philosophy of cultivating individuals with creativity and rich humanity, the university strives to contribute capable and compassionate graduates to society.

Currently (May 1,2025), 291 students from 37 countries are studying at Yamagata University, and there are exchange agreements with 131 universities in 37 countries for both students and academic teachers.

2. STEP-YU

Yamagata University offers two short-term programs for international students, providing students from our exchange universities with an opportunity to study here in Japan while remaining registered at their home schools. These programs are called STEP-YU (Short-Term Exchange Program at Yamagata University).

Mutual exchange of course credits and exemption from tuition fees for a fixed number of students are part of our exchange agreements. A list of our partner universities is available on our website.

General (Ippan) Exchange Program

Outline

This program aims to help both undergraduate and graduate students to further their Japanese language ability and their understanding of Japan, as well as their special studies and research. It offers regular faculty classes given in Japanese. Enrollment is generally possible in all faculties and post-graduate courses but may be limited to undergraduate students, depending on the contents of the agreement. Graduate students of science are expected to be fluent enough in Japanese for their everyday life, even if they perform their research in English. Therefore, students with low Japanese proficiency are strongly recommended to undergo Japanese language training, both before coming to Japan and during their study at Yamagata. Some even may have to change their program after application. As for possibilities to perform research in English, please ask your faculty directly.

Program Terms

April 1, 2026, either to September 30th, 2026, or March 31st, 2027 October 1, 2026, either to March 31st, 2027, or to September 30th, 2027

Conditions of Application

- Enrollment at a university or faculty on exchange agreement
- At least in the second year of undergraduate study at the time of application
- At least level N2 of the Japan Foundation's Japanese Language Placement Test
- Students who have already graduated from their home university, or who will graduate from their home university during the period of their intended study at Yamagata, may not apply

Yamagata University Japan Studies Program (JSP)

Outline

This program has been designed for undergraduate students in order to further their understanding of Japan independent of their Japanese language ability. Therefore, lectures on aspects of Japanese culture and society are offered in English. Students will be assigned to one of the faculties on Kojirakawa campus.

Program Terms

April 1, 2026, either to September 30th, 2026, or March 31st, 2027 October 1, 2026, either to March 31st, 2027, or to September 30th, 2027

Conditions of Application

- Enrollment at a university or faculty on exchange agreement
- At least in the second year of undergraduate study at the time of application
- Successful participation in at least 150 hours (one year) of Japanese language study at a teaching institution
- If level N3 of the Japan Foundation's Japanese Language Placement Test has not been attained, and the applicant is not a native speaker of English (or bilingual), the results of an English language test (e.g., TOEIC, IELTS, CET) will also have to be submitted. Applicants are expected to have English proficiency equivalent to CEFR level B2 or an IELTS score of 5.5 or higher
- Students who have already graduated from their home university, or who will graduate from their home university during the period of their intended study at Yamagata, may not apply

General (Ippan) Exchange Program

Japanese Language Course (Yamagata City Area)

All students are going to take Japanese languages classes at the level corresponding with the results of their placement test. The following are our Spring Semester courses; each class takes 90 minutes.

On arrival

After arriving in Yamagata, students will be lodged at either Yamagata International House or the Seimei Dormitory. Within two or three days, students will be required to register their addresses, open bank accounts and take their Japanese Placement Test, as well as to participate in a study orientation. Students are expected to register for their classes during the first week of term. A regular Yamagata University student will act as personal tutor in order to help you to get used to life in Yamagata.

Housing

Of the short-term international students at Yamagata University in Yamagata City, about 60 can be accommodated at either Seimei Dormitory or at International House (Kasumichō). This location will be decided in advance by the International Affairs Division. If the number of applicants should exceed the capacity of both dormitories, you may be required to live in a private apartment near the campus. Kasumichō International House is about 20 minutes from the campus, close to Yamagata Station, with good shopping opportunities. Seimei Dormitory will be about 30 minutes from Kojirakawa Campus.

Details of dormitory and communal service fees (per calendar month) and security deposits (payable upon checkin) are shown below. Bedding fees are about \(\frac{\pmathbf{11}}{11},700\) for one semester or about \(\frac{\pmathbf{15}}{15},000\) for one academic year. Electricity, gas, and water are paid separately. Fees include internet connection. The number of single rooms is limited; some students may have to share a two-bedroom apartment, generally arranged with respect to nationality. The security deposit is used for cleaning and other expenses upon moving out. If the deposit is insufficient, the remaining amount will be charged separately.

Note: Fees are for the 2025 academic year and these may be revised during the academic year due the policy changes.

Cost of living

Students who do not lodge at International House or Seimei Dormitory will be helped to find a room.

Upon moving in, a deposit equivalent to one to two months' rent will have to be paid as guarantee money. Living in Yamagata, students will not only have to pay for their room rent, but also for utilities, food, transportation, internet, mobile phone and entertainment. In total, this will come to approximately \(\frac{\text{\$\text{\$}}}{80,000}\) per month. If students do decide to work part-time, to a degree that will not harm their studies, they will have to obtain an advance permission to engage in activities outside those allowed by their visa, by submitting a special form, called *Application for Permission to Engage in Activity other than that Permitted under the Status of Residence Previously Granted*, and then receive approval at the Immigration Office. You may obtain on-the-spot permission to work upon first entering Japan when you pass through immigration.

Insurance

Exchange students are required to join the two types of insurance outlined below.

- (I) National Health Insurance (approx. \(\frac{\pmathbf{2}}{21,000}\) per year). International students residing in Japan and holding a student visa are required to join the National Health Insurance program. To receive medical treatment, simply show your insurance card at the hospital. Students only need to pay 30% of any medical costs.
- (II) Supplementary Insurance (approx. ¥12,500 per year). Personal liability insurance covers damage done to other persons such as might occur in everyday life, as well as any out-of-court settlement and mediation service costs.

Withdrawal from the Program

Withdrawal from the STEP-YU program will have to be notified to the International Affairs Division (during business hours) at least three weeks before planned departure. Residents of International House or of Seimei Dormitory may check out only during business hours. Students who live in a private apartment should refer to the relevant clauses in their contract. As for private apartments, Yamagata University will not be responsible for your checking-out arrangements.

5. How to Apply

For the selection of candidates for STEP-YU, grade point average, plan of study and research, and the two letters of recommendation issued by teachers will be considered. Students applying for the program are asked to send their complete application materials by electronic mail to the address on the cover of this pamphlet, through their home university's International Studies Office. The nomination of students is not required. Deadline for applications (Japan time) is

November 1, 2025, for students starting April 2026
 May 1, 2026, for students starting October 2026

6. Post-Application Process

Results of applications to Yamagata University will be sent to the office in charge of studying abroad at the applicant's home university.

Students enrolling in April:

- Mid to Late January: Sending Acceptance Letter
- End of February: Sending Certificate of Eligibility (CoE)

Students enrolling in October:

- Mid to Late July: Sending Acceptance Letter
- End of August: Sending Certificate of Eligibility (CoE)

We ask all students to undergo the necessary procedures with their Japanese Embassy or Consulate, and to get their plane tickets by themselves early enough.

Note that even after a Letter of Acceptance has been issued, the acceptance process can and will still be suspended if the submitted documents are found to be insufficient.
